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
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# Harnessing Youth Potential: The YEC Project Final Conference

Held on October 21, 2021, the final conference of the Youth Employability Competences project offered a brief but packed schedule focusing on different aspects of employability, youth in the labour market and the project outcomes. The event was well attended by professionals from Europe and beyond in the fields of youth work, career guidance, academia and more.

After kicking off the event by learning about the backgrounds of everyone who joined, lead partner Ballymun Job Centre (Ireland) introduced the project and presented a video of members of the youth advisory board who shared their experiences and gave voice to the young people who participated in the project.

The external project evaluator, Finbarr Fitzpatrick, presented his findings on the impact, barriers, and enablers from utilizing advisory boards as a participatory method. Fitzpatrick identified a clear improvement in confidence and self-esteem among the young participants, who were treated as equals and co-owned the process. Both youth and employers in the





boards clearly gained a deeper understanding of what skills are required in today's labour market, why they are important and sought after and how to prove them.

We then welcomed keynote speaker Niall O'Higgins, a senior research specialist at the International Labour Organisation, who discussed the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic on youth unemployment. O'Higgins shared that young people, especially young women, have

suffered much bigger falls in employment, translating into increased inactivity and NEET. He concluded by warning of the danger that short-term job (opportunity) loss will turn into long-term exclusion of young people from the labour market.

In the last session of the conference, participants selected a breakout room in which they could find out more about one of the intellectual outputs of the project.
